Dear Members

# Changes have started and others are on the way!!

We also took the opportunity to update the Constitution. We have been working with a Solicitor (Oktay Çinar) the grandson of one of our Founding Members, on both aspects so that it is all completed correctly. This work is being done free of charge and we are very grateful for his time and guidance.

More information will be passed on in due course.

One of the minor changes you will have already been experiencing is the way receipts are now written — one for <u>each</u> person. This, of course makes issuing them more time-consuming and it is one of the reasons that payment in advance of events is most welcome. Thank you for your co-operation.

Current status of Cultural Events

Our events continue to be well-received and supported by you and your friends and we thank you for your support. For this reason, we rarely find it necessary to advertise our events in the local press but will endeavour to keep the Association in the news by sending write-ups and photos to the press post-event.

This year the ATA tour in September was to the Ottoman Balkans. The overall report back was that once again it was a successful tour. Some issues were raised and observations highlighted. These will be addressed elsewhere.

Back from the summer break, we kicked off the final quarter of the year with:

• A Social Gathering at the Wild Duck Restaurant in Lapta. The feedback was that we should have these more often. Since we do not have a meeting place, it is good that occasionally members have the opportunity to meet-up without a speaker so they can spend more time getting to know each other. We hear you!

This event was followed by:

- A Dowsing weekend in the Karpaz. A weekend full of interesting experiences, giving those who had completed the preliminary training the opportunity to practice and stretch their fledgling skills under the guidance of our 'resident trainers', Rob and Suzy. The weather was kind and swimming in the still-warm sea was a great way to wind down as well as cool off.
- Dowsing for beginners was next on the agenda:
  This subject is proving to be hugely popular and waiting lists are turning into further waiting lists.
- A return visit to the 'Lost City of Macaria':

What started as a very popular event became plagued by drop-outs for various reasons and the event looked as though it would falter. However,

with re-arranged plans and despite the forecast of rain, an intrepid group set out for the venue and had a very pleasant outing. The threatened rain did arrive just as we got back to our cars. Thank you my flexible friends!!!

• The Whirling Dervishes is next on the agenda but I'm hoping to get this newsletter, which I started a month ago, out to you before that event takes place.

Perhaps, I should just write less but what good is a newsletter if it doesn't contain news - especially for those who for one reason or another have been unable to attend many or any of the events.

Before I end the subject of events, I would like to point out what is becoming obvious to regular event attendees. Costs are rising as is happening with everything everywhere. We are having little space to manoeuvre in negotiating the prices set. Food per head is fixed unless it is an option to choose and pay for your individual meal.

If cancellations are not received within the specified time, payment is expected for the numbers booked. On occasions when this has been flouted, the ATA ends up paying and that is hardly fair as it is, in fact, your member colleagues who pay as the money comes from the funds that has been donated to support projects within the community.

The price of the coach, where this is part of the event, is also fixed dependent on the size of the group, whether it will be staying with us all day etc.

The total of all expected outgoings are equally divided among the expected number of participants and since most people want to know the cost before committing, this can then prove problematic when drop-outs then start to arise. I think you can work out the maths here.

So, I want to end with a plea - please give this information considered thought in order that we can set and keep our prices at the best levels possible and eradicate the frustration that is encountered when the best laid plans start to unravel. I really thank you for your cooperation with this.

**Projects** 

I recently sent out an email inviting you to submit any 'community' projects that you might be aware of, for consideration of our financial support. It seems that there is some misunderstanding of the difference between <u>Projects</u> and <u>Events</u> judging from the fact that all of the few replies I received put forward ideas for events.

Some clarification then -

<u>Projects</u> are those areas in the <u>community</u> which may benefit from support by way of a monetary donation. They are usually selected from requests that we receive from either members or persons acting for and on behalf of any legitimate worthy cause. We have looked at streamlining these requests by putting together the application form which was sent out with the email as in the past it was not unusual to have the same people making repeated requests and we felt that this should be more evenly spread.

Some examples of projects are: part-payment for a photocopier to Lapta school, weighing and measuring equipment to the paediatric clinic at Lapta Health Clinic, English language books and equipment to another school to support the teaching/learning of English. Most recently, the replacement of drainpipes and manhole covers at Lefko a's SOS village.

The <u>project fund</u> is made up of the money you donate within the cost of events and your membership fees.

<u>Events</u> are the trips, tours, walks, talks, etc which are organised for <u>you the</u> <u>members</u>.

Got it! Then please try harder as we are urgently seeking worthy causes for 2016.

# Debriefing meeting following the Balkans Tour

I apologise that this information was not sent out immediately after the meeting but took the view that it should be addressed to the wider membership and decided to address it thus rather than just to those who were on the tour.

The meeting, headed up by Harry and Gülter, was held at the request of member/s who wished clarification on some issues about the Balkans Tour and the ATA tours in general. Also in question, was how the organisational and administrative responsibilities for arranging the tours had been decided (see attachments).

Only members who had been on the tour were invited to the meeting. Those who couldn't attend submitted comments.

A synopsis of the meeting is given here.

The main points were about the travel agent and the representative of the travel agent. Other points concerned the timing of flights, preference for the use of local guides etc.

There was a healthy discussion of all the points raised and I believe that they have been addressed in the coming year's tours.

Before the meeting ended I made the suggestion that perhaps briefing meetings should be held as soon as possible after return to Cyprus. Gülter went one better by suggesting that these are held on the last evening of the tours when reps are available to answer tour members' queries. I would further suggest that a synopsis report of the content of these sessions is made and submitted to the Committee on return.
